

A. M. E. Church Festival.

A large number of our citizens attended the New England festival given by the ladies of the above named church on Wednesday evening, at the armory. The hall was crowded at an early hour, the guests spending the first hour in social promenades and admiring the beauties to be seen upon the different tables and listening to the inspiring notes of the Knights Templars band, the boys having generously donated their services for the occasion.
