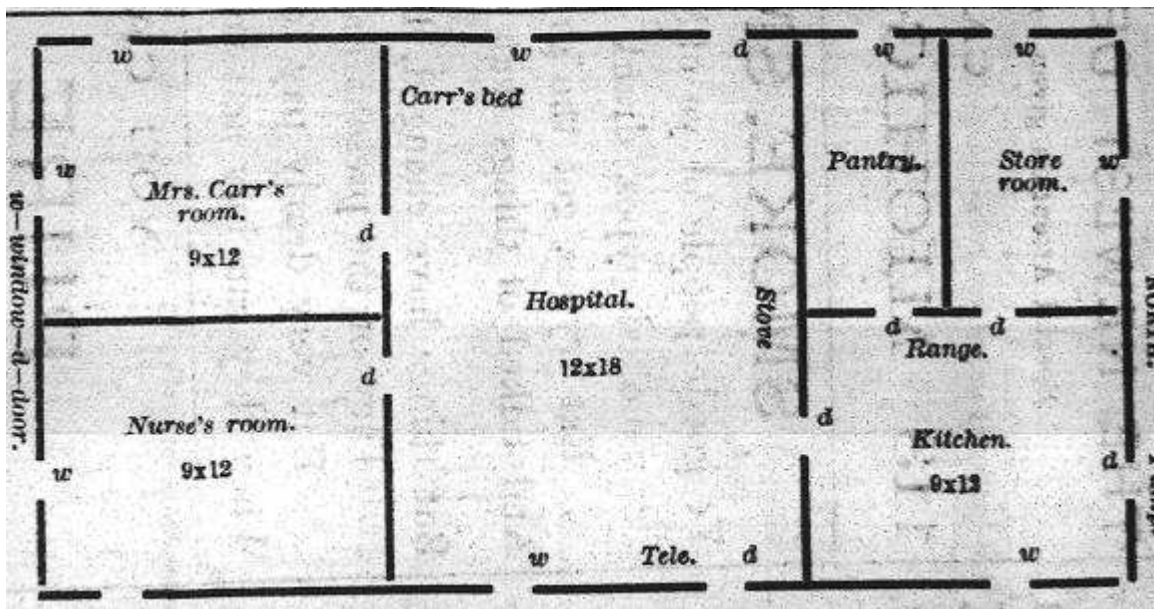


The Pest House
IS NOW COMPLETED AND IS COMFORTABLE AND COZY
Its Location and Construction with Diagrams Showing Interior Arrangement —
Patient Carr Died at 9 O'clock Monday Afternoon

As stated in the State Republican on Saturday, the pest house has been completed, and all arrangements made for caring for the afflicted. Mr. Carr, the last overtaken by the disease, was removed from the city on Sunday morning, and no fears are now entertained of a further spread of contagion. By the removal the patient suffered no ill effects and rested as comfortably as could be expected.

The house is one story, 18x36 and contains six rooms, as shown in the following diagram:



It is papered on the inside with heavy paper, and otherwise made cozy and comfortable. Provisions and all cooking paraphernalia have been supplied, and nothing omitted that would add to the comfort or needs of the patient. The building is situated in the woods immediately adjoining the southern corner of Mt. Hope Cemetery, on a beech clad knoll on the east bank of Sycamore creek, and a view of the country is cut off by intervening high ground, all combining to make its location an exceedingly pleasant one. Mrs. Carr accompanied her husband and cared for him in his affliction, assisted by Mr. Henry Keters, nurse in charge. The vehicle in which the patient was transferred has been thoroughly disinfected, and will remain at the pest house, and will not be used for any other purpose during the prevalence of the disease. Everything possible has been done by the proper authorities to prevent the spread of the disease, and it is now believed that the threatening waves of desolation will subside.

Mr. Carr died at 2 o'clock this afternoon.
